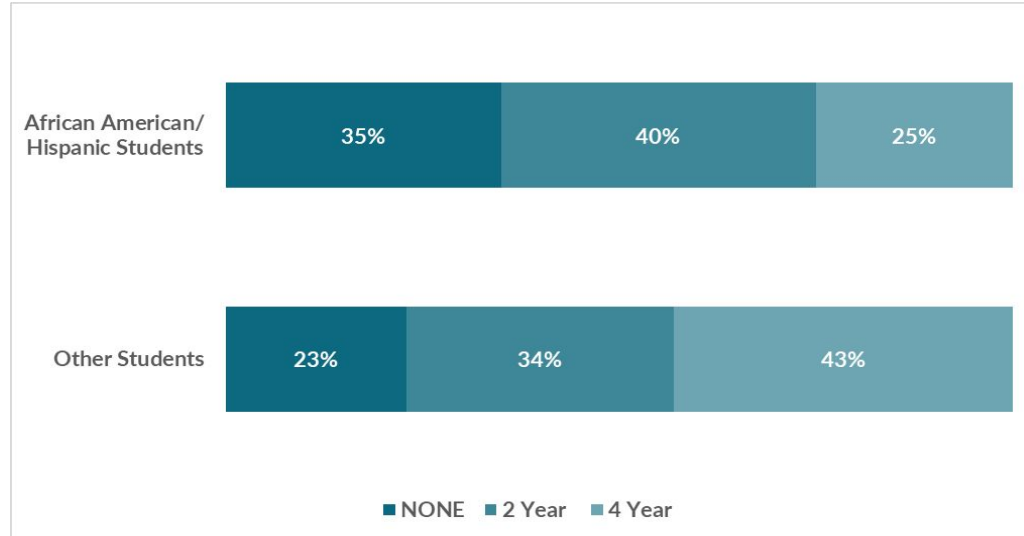
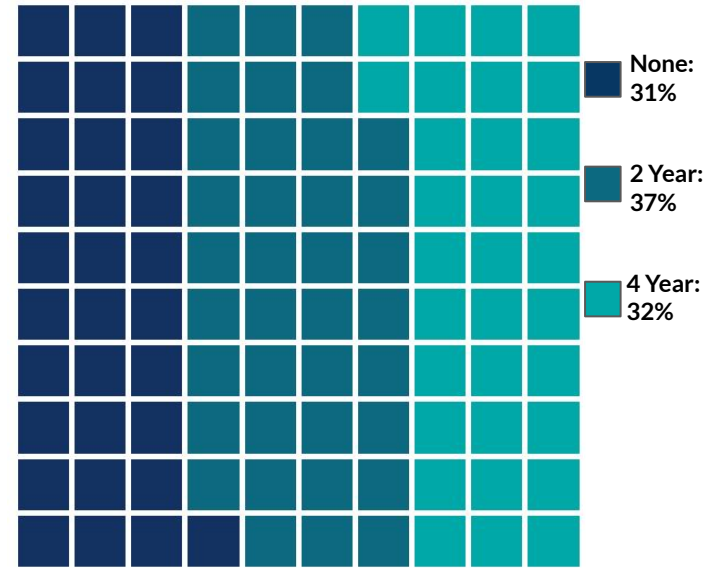




# LBUSD Student College Enrollment Patterns

# First Year College Fall Enrollment:

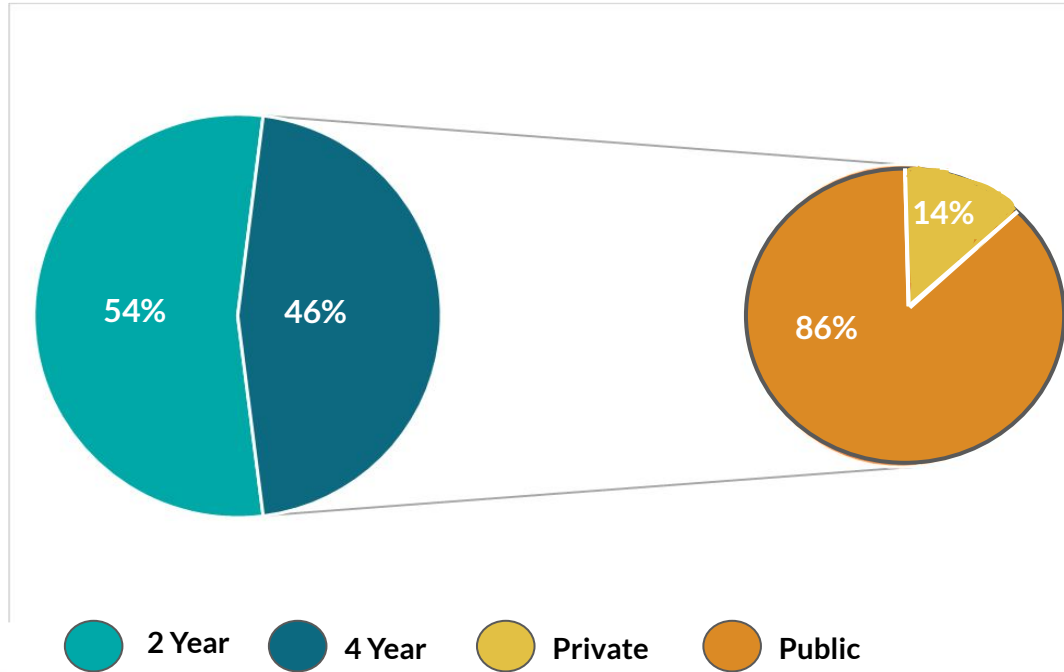
About  $\frac{2}{3}$  of High School students enroll in college immediately after graduation. The majority of students who do enroll attend two-year institutions.



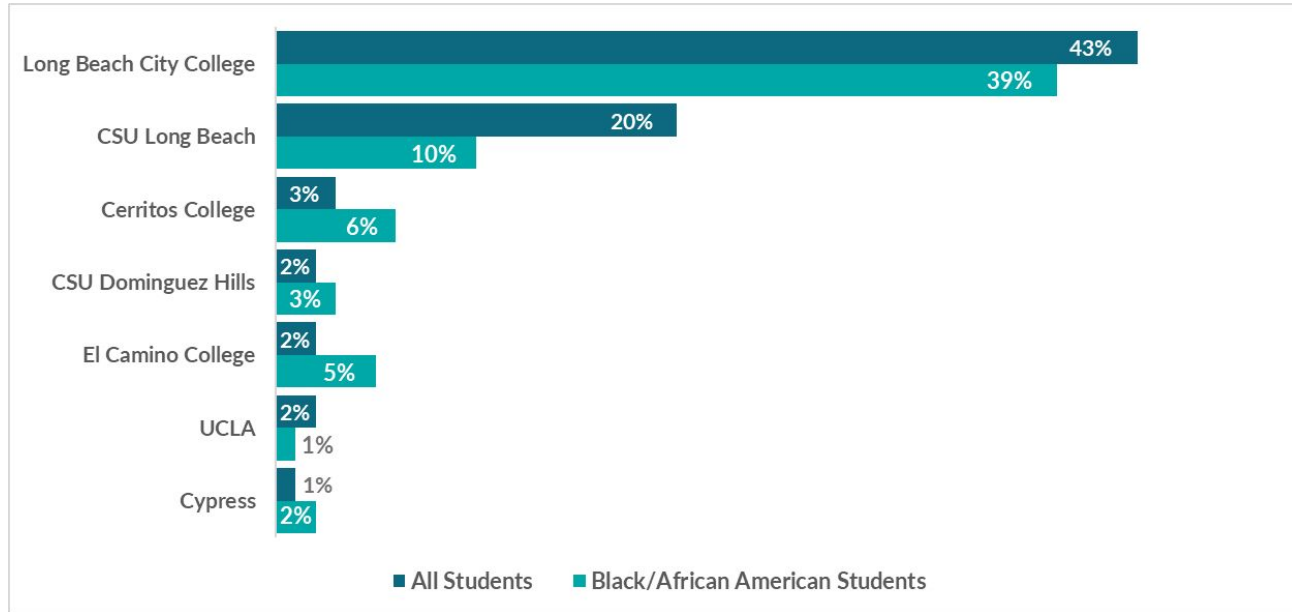
African American and Hispanic Students who immediately enroll in college are significantly more likely to enroll in a two-year institution.

# Enrollment in Public and Private Colleges

The majority of students that enroll in college within one year of graduating high school attend 2 Year institutions. Of those who enroll in a 4 Year college, the vast majority (86%) attend a public institution



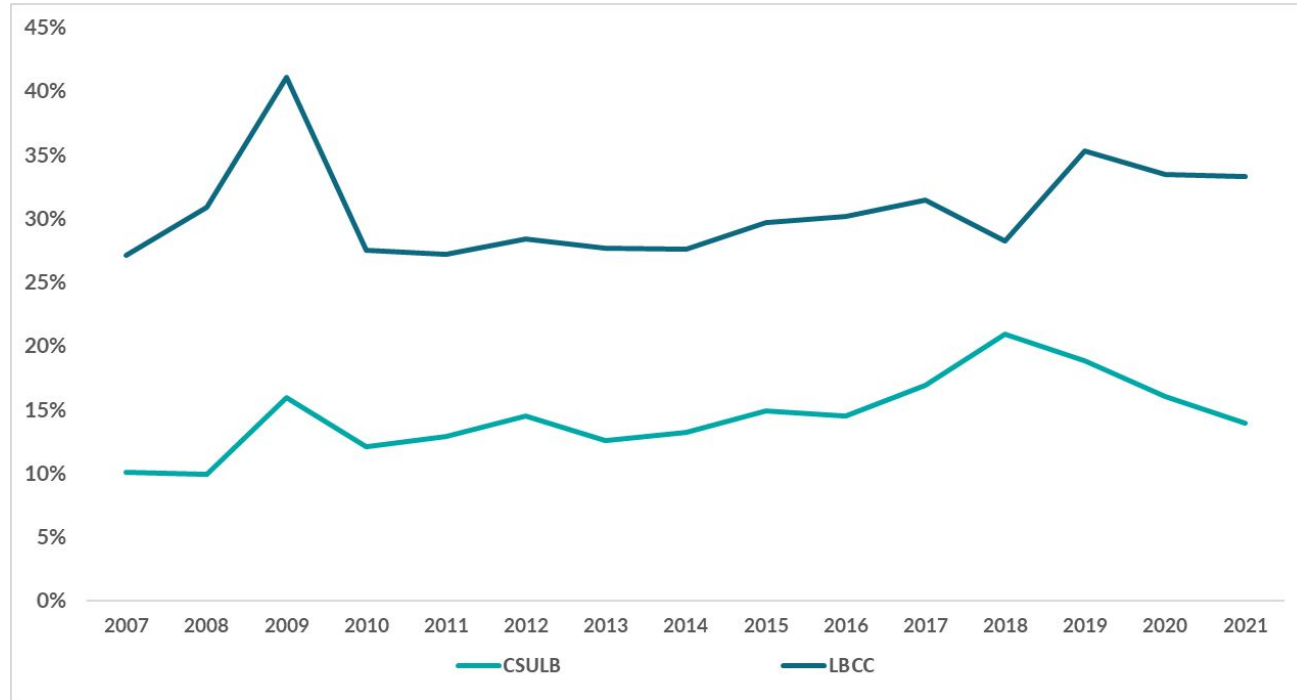
# Top Ten Colleges Immediately Enrolled in After High School



20% of LBUSD graduates who immediately transitioned into college enrolled in CSULB.

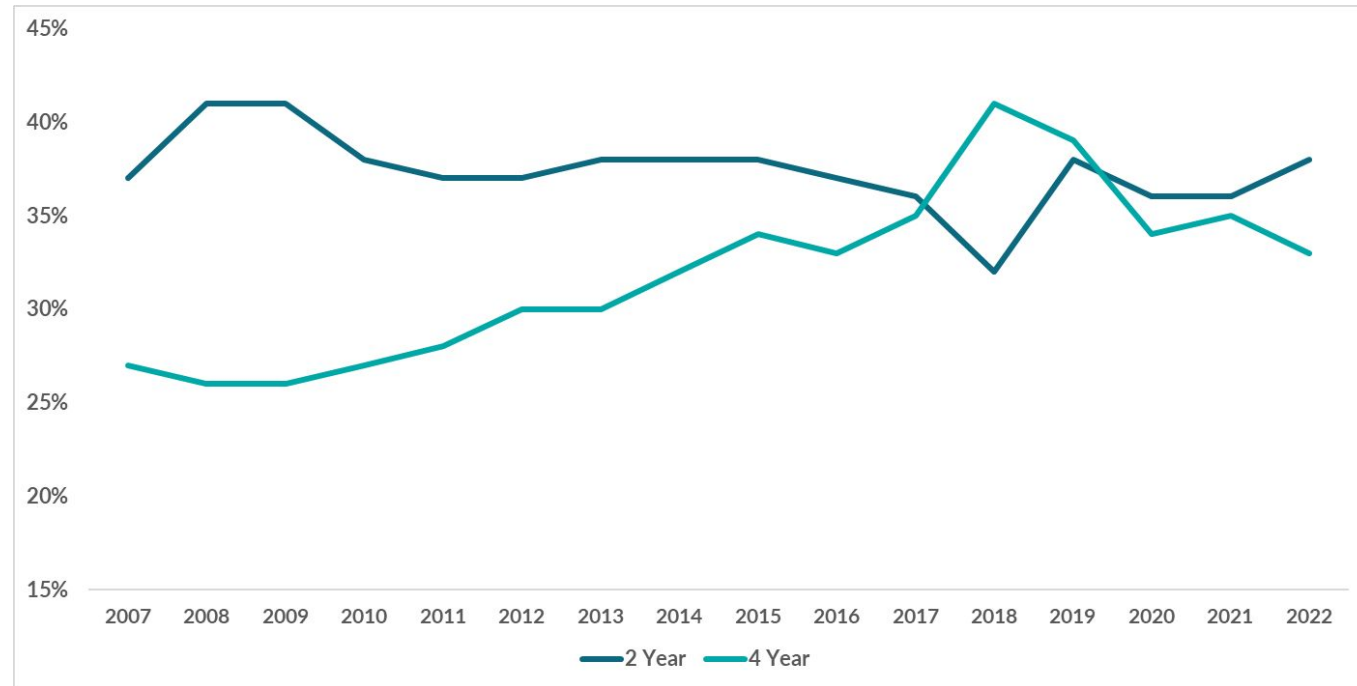
# LBCC and CSULB

The percent of High School graduates who enroll into either CSULB or LBCC has gradually increased since 2007



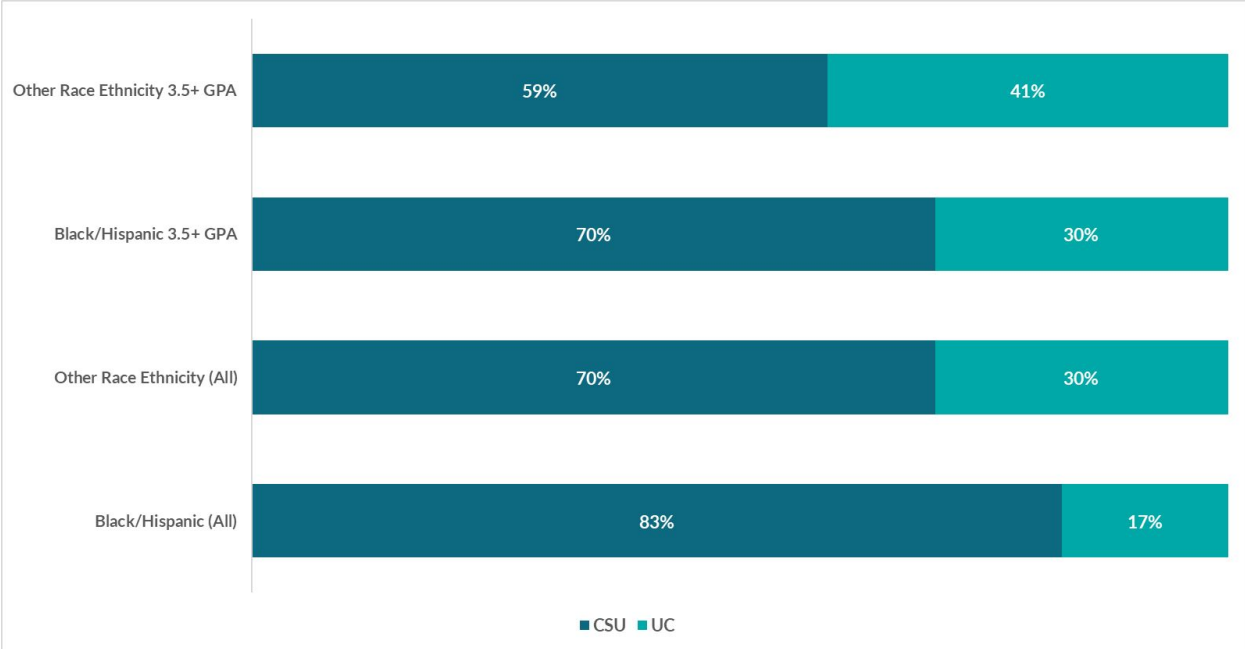
# Enrollment in 2-year and 4-year institutions

The gap between students enrolling in two-year versus four-year colleges within the first semester of graduation has narrowed significantly over time, *with a greater percentage of students enrolling in college overall*



# First Year College Enrollment: CSU VS UC

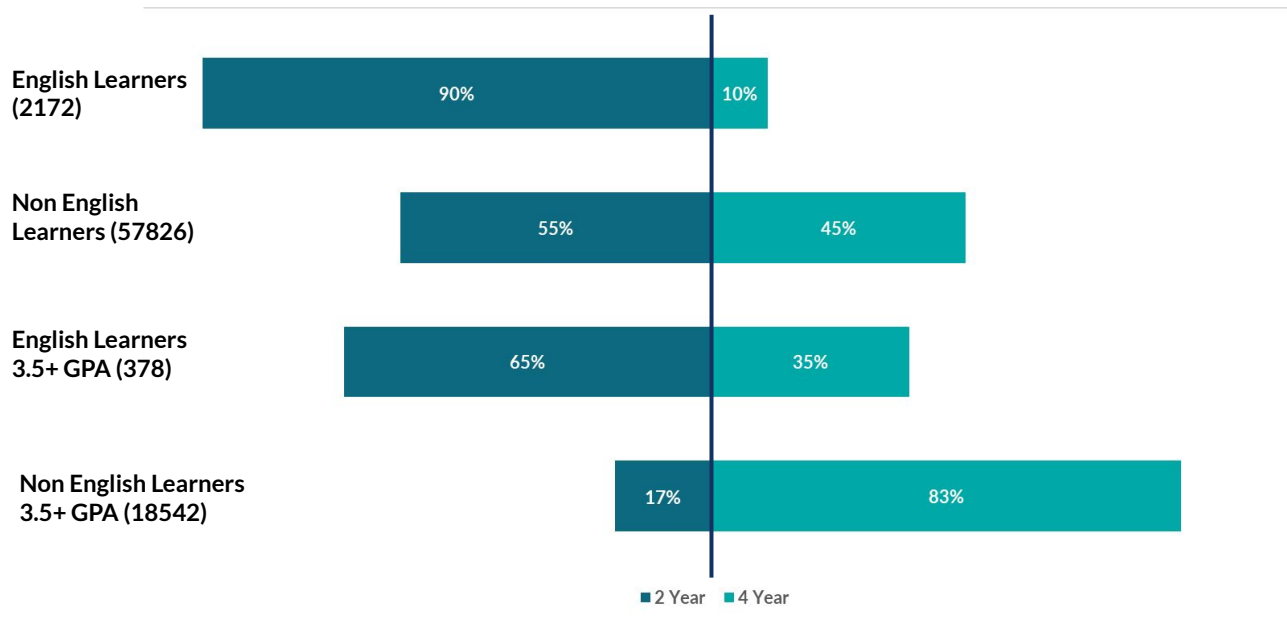
Of students who enrolled in college within one year after graduation, those who identified as Black or Hispanic were more likely to attend a CSU rather than a UC. This discrepancy remained even when controlling for student GPA.



# First Year College Enrollment: Current English Learners

English learner students are more likely to enroll in a 2 year institution than non-English learner students.

This pattern remained even when controlling for Student GPA.



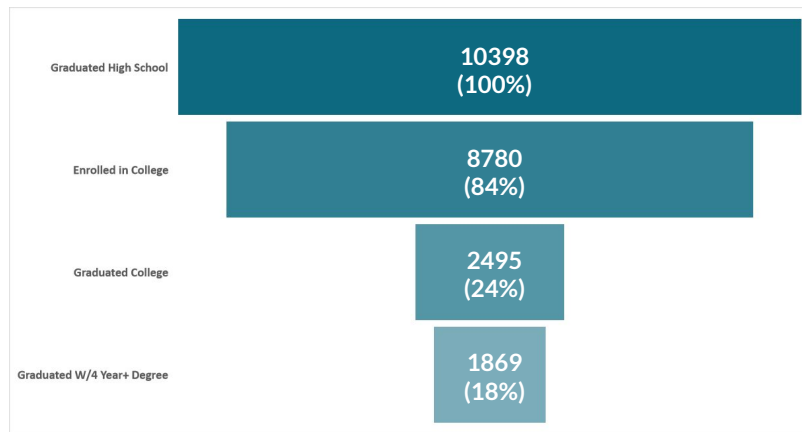


# College Graduation (High School Cohort 2007-2018):

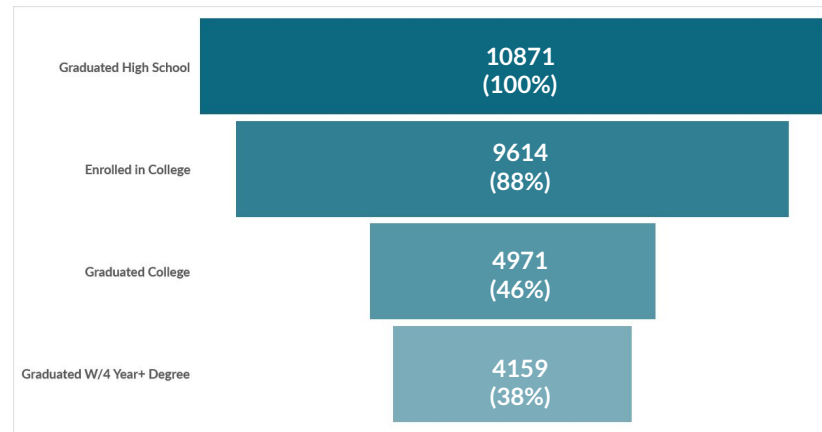
African American and White Students that graduated from high school enrolled in college at similar rates; however, overall attrition was greater for African American students.

Just under half of White students enrolled in college went on to receive a four year degree, this figure was less than one in five for African American students

## White Students

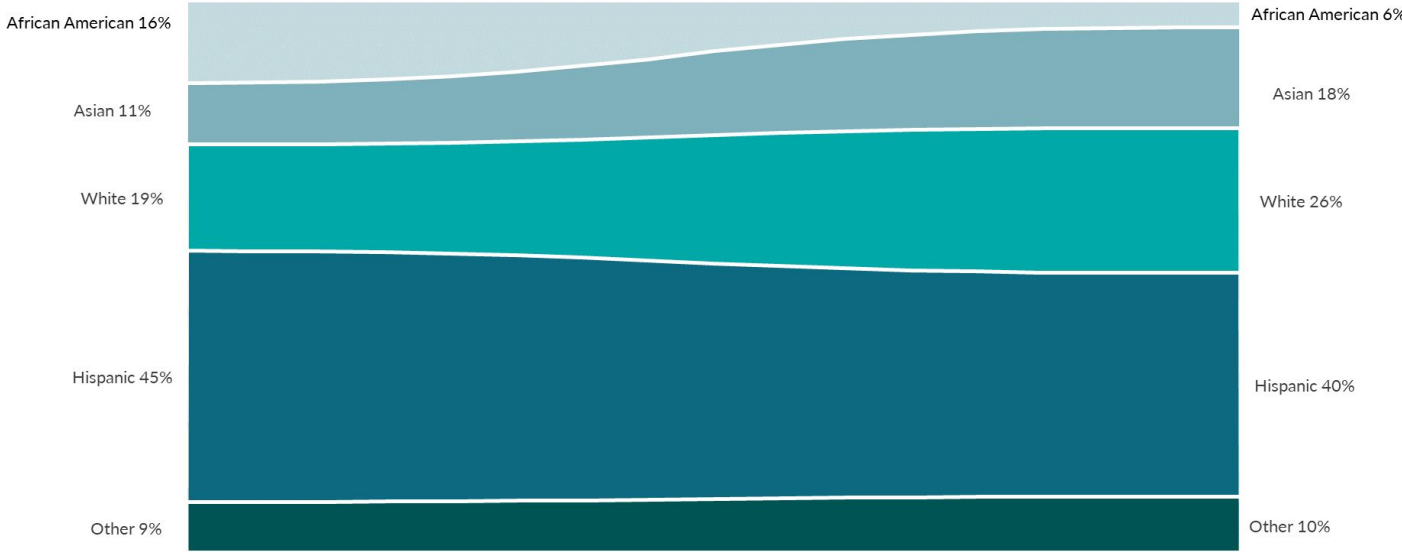


# First Year College Enrollment: Long Beach College Promise

Group as a Percent of Students Enrolled in College Within One Year

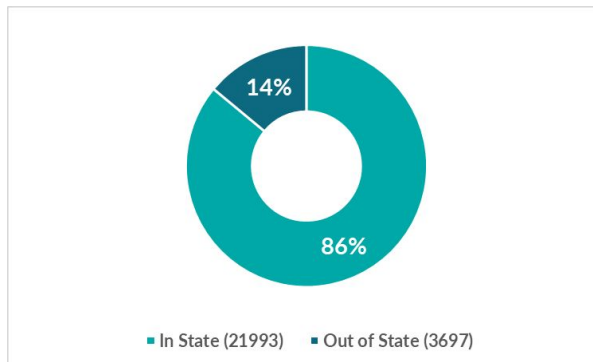
Group as a Percent of Students Participaing in LB College Promise

# First Year College Enrollment: Long Beach College Promise

Roughly **86%** of All Students who enrolled in a 4 year college within the first year after graduating High School opted to do so in California.



**African American** students who attended a 4-Year college after High School were **more likely** to enroll in an **out-of-state institution** than students from other Ethnic/Racial groups
